Ruth Asawa's Recipe for Baker's Clay 1 cup of salt 4 cups of flour 1½ cups of water

Mix these ingredients thoroughly with the hands, adding a little more water if necessary. Knead about five minutes until clay is soft and pliable or use a food processor. Liquid tempera or food coloring may be added to the water to make colored clay or a single batch may be divided into small amounts and different colored water added to each. Loops of wire can be embedded on the backs of sculptures. Wire and other metal objects can be added for embellishment. Bake on foil-covered baking sheets in a 350-degree oven till nicely browned and hard all the way through. Thick large pieces will require a longer time than small flat pieces. During dry weather, dough may be left to dry with no baking.


Two-Hole Journal With Rubber Band Binding

WHAT YOU NEED


paper for pages heavy paper for front and back covers manual two-hole punch small paper clips rubber bands 2 to 3 inches long sticks

WHAT YOU DO

- 1. Cut paper for pages to desired size that will accommodate two holes 3 inches apart. For each student, cut enough pages for each art class plus a few extra. More pages can be added later if needed.
- 2. Cut covers from heavy paper like recycled file folders. Cut them the same size as the pages.
- 3. Punch holes in all paper with manual two-hole punch. NOTE: These are available from Office Depot for about \$6.




- 4. Choose sticks about the size of a pencil and cut about 5 inches long.
- 5. Hand out paper and covers, sandwiching pages between covers. Tap spine side on table to help align holes.
- 6. Hand out small paperclips. Open them up, squeezing the small end into a hook. This will be used to thread the rubber band through the holes.
- 7. Begin with the front cover on top. Slip the hook through the top holes. Thread the rubber band over the hook and pull through the holes until about a $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch loop remains.



8. Slip the stick through the remaining loop and release the hook. This will anchor the rubber band as it is pulled through the bottom holes.

9. Now insert the hook into the bottom holes again working from the front side. Thread the rubber band over the hook and pull it through the bottom holes. Now slip the band over the other end of the stick.



10. Decorate the cover. Add a title, date, and first and last names.

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
